Rule Utilitarianism - The ethical merit of an act is judged in terms of what the consequences of the action would be if such conduct became the general rule and everyone acted accordingly. Consequentialism has the merit of calling attention to all stakeholders because it requires the decision maker to predict the likely results of an act and weigh the good it will produce against the harm it would cause.

(a) Consequentialism (and utilitarianism) Whether an act is morally right depends solely on consequences or the goodness of consequences. (b) Virtue ethics

Difference Between Consequentialism and Utilitarianism ...

Consequentialism is an ethical theory that judges whether or not something is right by what its consequences are. For instance, most people would agree that lying is wrong. But if telling a lie would help save a person's life, consequentialism says it's the right thing to do. Two examples of consequentialism are utilitarianism and hedonism.

Consequentialism - Ethics Unwrapped

The paradigm case of consequentialism is utilitarianism, whose classic proponents were Jeremy Bentham (1789), John Stuart Mill (1861), and Henry Sidgwick (1907). (For predecessors, see Schneewind 1997, 2002.) Classic utilitarians held hedonistic act consequentialism.

Human practices that produce good consequences are morally right, while ones that produce bad consequences are morally wrong. Roughly speaking, a consequentialist says that you should do certain things, because those actions produce good consequences. By far the most common historical variant of consequentialism is Classic Utilitarianism.

Ethics Updates: Consequentialism & Utilitarianism

In utilitarianism, consequences of an action are determined by a 'greatest good for the greatest number'. Hedonism, in contrast, states something is good if its results produce pleasure or avoid pain. Furthermore, consequentialism is often contrasted with deontology as well as virtue ethics.
