Mill had been somewhat coy about publishing *The Subjection of Women* during his lifetime because he feared the condemnation of his peers for daring to apply the general notions of individual liberty which he had clearly spelled out in *On Liberty* to the particular case of women. So he withheld publication until just before his death.
